

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


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# BULAWAYO

#### History and Progress

Bulawayo, the second largest city in Rhodesia and capital of the province of Matabeleland, is located in an area selected by Lobengula, last of the Matabele kings, for his personal kraal. (Government House now stands on the actual site.) The name is generally interpreted as "killed", derived from the Matabele word "bulala"—to kill. It refers to incidents in Matabele history, and also to a place in Zululand, with which the Matabele were originally associated. The Rhodes-Rudd Concession, which was the foundation of Rhodes' power in the country and led to the grant of a Royal Charter to the British South Africa Company, was signed on 30th October, 1888, at Umvutja, a few miles north of Bulawayo on the right bank of the Umgusa river. The town was occupied by the 1893 Pioneer Columns on 4th November, 1893, following the Matabele War.

Bulawayo was declared a town by Dr. Leander Starr Jameson on 1st June 1894; received municipal status in 1897, the year the first train from the South reached Bulawayo, and was made a City on 4th November, 1943, fifty years after its occupation. It celebrated its 75th anniversary in 1968. The streets in the city centre and many suburbs are named after personalities connected with the early history of Bulawayo.

Situated astride the main lines of communication by road, rail and air between the North and South of the African sub-continent, Bulawayo is especially favoured by its geographical position as an industrial, commercial and tourist centre.

It is the headquarters of the Rhodesia Railways system and, as the hub of this system and the point of entry and exit for much of the trade with South Africa, has distribution facilities unequalled in Central Africa, which serves the markets of South Africa, Botswana, Zambia, the Congo and Mocambique.

Because of this, Bulawayo has become one of the main industrial centres of Central Africa. Nearly 600 factories are arleady established and they produce a great variety of articles. Rhodesia's biggest concentration of engineering and metal industries, as well as of textile mills and clothing factories is located in Bulawayo, which is also one of the principal radio manufacturing centres in Africa and the home of Rhodesia's only tyre factory. Other industries include agricultural implements, blanket weaving, breweries and distilleries, cereal milling. clay and cement processing, coach building, confectionery,



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The policy of the City Council is to encourage the establishment of new industries, and for this purpose it has made available adequate supplies of land, power and water, at extremely competitive rates.

The surrounding area is noted for its cattle ranching, and its mines produce nearly half of Rhodesia's mineral output. Asbestos, chrome, coal, copper, gold, mica, tin and emeralds are the chief minerals produced, whilst many semi-precious stones are now being marketed. Recent discoveries of nickel and copper show great potential.

As a tourist centre, Bulawayo is the ideal place from which to plan tours to the Matopo Hills, Khami Ruins, Wankie Game Park, Victoria Falls and the western end of Lake Kariba, as well as to the Zimbabwe Ruins with its nearby lovely Lake Kyle. Shopping facilities in the City are renowned and hotels and motels of good standard cater for every taste. A wide variety of sporting and cultural activities is available to visitors, who find much to see and do.

One of the most lavishly equipped Caravan Parks in Southern Africa provides all modern amenities for the caravaner in close proximity to the City centre.

Rhodesia's International Trade Fair-Rhodesia, established in Bulawayo in 1960 and one of Africa's biggest shop windows, is staged each year in April/May for ten days. Visitors may, however, visit the Trade Fair grounds at any time.

Coolly situated high above the Lake in the Kariba township, the Kariba Heights Hotel alfords visitors to the largest man-made lake in the world, Southern Hospitality, rest and relaxation in the hills. Magnificent views over Lake Kariba and the opportunity to see big game and indulge in the best fresh water fishing in the world, including the famous tiger fish.

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 The Civic Centre, with its two City Halls, is built upon the site of the famous laager of the Matabele Rebellion days (1896) and is sited in the square formed by Selborne and Bighth Avenues, Fife and Grey Streets.

The old well, which was then the beleagured township's only water supply, was sunk during the Rebellion in what are now the City Hall gardens. The well was later filled in and all trace of it disappeared. It was rediscovered in 1951 after an intensive search, and has been reopened.

In the foyer of the Council Chamber is the famous picture of an episode in Rhodesian history, the last stand of Major Allan Wilson and his patrol of 33 men on the Shangani River in December, 1893. The picture, entitled "To the Memory of Brave Men", was presented in 1898 to the people of Rhodesia by Mr. G. Cawston, one of the founders of the British South Africa Company. Also on display is the illuminated address from the College of Heralds conferring Bulawayo's coat-of-arms when it received city status in 1943; the Civic Honours Book; and part of the collection of Civic plate presented during the City's 75th anniversary in 1968.

A plaque erected over the Fife Street entrance to the Municipal offices depicts the first "indaba" between Cecil Rhodes and the rebel Matabele in the Matapos on 21st August, 1896, when there were present all the great chiefs, indunas and councillors of the Matabele nation. This "indaba" marked the beginning of the end of the Matabele Rebellion, and was a personal triumph for Rhodes, and an example of his courage.

The Clock and chimes were presented to the people of Bulawayo as a Jubilee gift in 1940 by Mrs. E. L. Wynne.

In the gardens is a statue of Sir Charles Coghlan, first Premier of Southern Rhodesia, who was elected in 1923, when Rhodesia obtained responsible government. The statue overlooks the pioneers' Memorial Pool, officially opened on 31st October, 1957, during the Diamond Jubilee Celebrations of the establishment of the municipality.

Curio Sellers. In Fife Street, on the pavement outside the City Hall gardens are the flower, beadwork and curio sellers, as well as basket makers and artists.

A 24-hour free car park is provided in the City Hall grounds.

- 2. Art Gallery. Situated behind the City Hall facing Grey Street, the Art Gallery was opened on 4th December, 1970, and contains a permanent exhibition of paintings, tapestries and sculpture, Several travelling exhibitions exhibit at the Gallery each year. Exhibitions of the work of Rhodesian artists are held frequently.
- 3. Jairos Jiri Craft Shop. The Jairos Jiri Association for the Rehabiliation of Disabled and Blind and the Tribal Trust Land Development Corporation run the craft shop jointly, the profit from which supports the Association and the further development of rural crafts. The shop is situated next to the art gallery on the corner of Grey Street and Selbotne Avenue, and has a wide variety of African arts and crafts for sale.
- 4. National Museum of Rhodesia Built in Colosseum style situated in Centenary Park, Selborne Avenue, the museum, medern in concept and layout, contains exhibits illustrating the history, mineral wealth and wild life of Rhodesia. The invertebrate gallery includes scenes of a coral reef, the Chirundu Forest in eastern Rhodesia and a Natal seaside rockpool. The Doddieburn elephant in the foyer is one of the largest mounted elephants known, standing 11 ft. 7 in, at the shoulder. The "Hall of Chiefs" includes a special exhibit dedicated to Cecil John Rhodes. Open daily including Sundays and Public Holidays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission Sc. Bus No. 5.

Adjoining the National Museum is an open-air display of mining antiquaria, opened on 3rd December, 1970, containing specimens of all types of the plant and equipment used during the early days of European mining in Rhodesia.

- 5. Rhodes Statue. This is the only statue of Rhodes modelled from life, and is sited at the interesction of Eighth Avenue and Main Street, facing north. Designed by John Tweed, it will be noted that it was deemed superfluous to name the statue.
- 6. War Memorial. On the west side of Main Street between Selborne and Eighth Avenues, next to the Information Bureau. It is a cloister built in Pasipas sandstone with a rough monolith of Matopos granite as a central feature, Memorial tablets with the names of the fallen are on the cloister walls.
- Rebellion Memorial. At the junction of Main Street and Selborne Avenue. Erected in memory of the civilians and soldiers killed in the Matabele Rebellion in 1896.

- 8. Swimming Pool. The pool, which is on the fringe of Central Park, in Borrow Street, Eighth Avenue, is open from September to May each year. Set amidst tall and graceful trees, with terraceed lawns, the pool is one of the finest in Southern Africa and has been built to Olympic standard. Light lunches and teas can be obtained. A children's paddling pool is provided. Other pools are situated in the suburbs of North End and Paddonhurst. The Coloured community has a modern and very attractive pool at Barham Green and there are modern swimming pools for the African people at Barbourfields and Mpopoma.
- 9. Parks. The parks are situated on both sides of Selborne Avenue and visitors entering the city by road from Beitbridge pass between them. More than 112 acres in extent, they contain many picturesque walks, delightfully shaded lawns and some fine botanical specimens of trees and shrubs. Centenary Park contains an aviary, model boating pond, miniature railway, children's playground and a small game park stocked with small indigenous buck, tortoises, rabbits and peacocks. Regular band performances are held at week-ends, when a cafe providing light refreshments is open. The National Museum of Rhodesia and Bulawayo Theatre are both sited in the Centenary Park area. Visitors will find the parks an ideal place to relax, especially if they have chidren with them. Bus No. 5.

Hume Park, an area along the banks of the Matsheumhlope River, is situated at the junction of the Salisbury Road and First Avenue, and is named after a Pioneer of Rhodesia.

- 10. Miniature Railway; Putting Green. In Centenary Park, and open on Saturday afternoons, Sundays and Public Holidays. Laid in a beautiful setting, both amenities are sponsored by Bulawayo Round Table. Charges: Children 5c, Adults 10c
- II. Lendy Memorial. In Centenary Park beside Selborne Avenue. A sandstone obelisk in memory of Captain C. F. Lendy, R.A., who commanded the artillery of the Victoria Column in the Matabele War and died as a result of service then. Bus No. 5.
- 12. 75th Anniversary Fountain. This, the most spectacular ornamental fountain in Rhodesia, is sited in Central Park, facing Selborne Avenue, and was built to commemorate the 75th anniversary of Bulawayo. The fountain commenced playing on 4th November, 1968. It has a variety of changes of water height and colour and has become a popular evening rendezvous. Bus No. 5.

13. Children's Traffic Training Centre. This centre, in Centenary Park, with access from Fourth Avenue, trains primary schoolchildren in road sense and traffic regulations. It is open from Monday to Friday during school term times. Visitors welcome. Telephone 60578.

14. Rhodes' Rondavel and Lobengula's Indaba Tree. Situated in the grounds of Government House and approached by Lady



Stanley Avenue (Victoria Falls Road) is the original rondavel used by Rhodes on his visits to Bulawayo before Government House, designed by his architect Sir Herbert Baker, was built on the site of the royal kraal of Lobengula, the last king of the Matabele nation. Within the ron-

davel is a pictorial record of Rhodes' life and a model of Lobengula's Bulawayo.

15. The Mzilikazi Art and Craft Centre, part of the City of Bulawayo's welfare organisation, is situated in Mzilikazi Village, near Mpilo Hospital, and has a flourishing pottery, together with a sculpture centre and drawing and painting studios, with groups of young men and women working on ceramics and mosaics. Visitors are welcome at the Centre, but should telephone 61708 to confirm their visit. Visiting hours are 10.30 a.m. to 12 noon from Monday to Friday; other times by appointment only.

16. White Men's Camp. At the corner of Donovan Street and Athlone Avenue, North End, and about 1½ miles from (14) above, a plaque erected by the Historical Monuments Commission recalls that, prior to 1893, travellers, prospectors and others had to camp here whilst awaiting summons to appear before Lobengula before proceeding further. Bus No. 1.

17. Coleabrander Memorial. In Coleabrander Avenue, at the junction of Harris Street opposite Kennedy Road, is a Khami granite plinth with a bronze plaque commemorating Colonel Johann Colenbrander, C.B., a Pioneer of Rhodesia, who contributed in great measure to the founding of Bulawayo. Bus No. 3.

18. Loch Lion. A five-acre ornamental lake, sponsored by the Lions Club of Bulawayo, situated along the Matsheumhlope River, adjoining Trade Fair Rhodesia in 15th Avenue/Borrow Street. Canoes and boats are available for hire. Open daily.

- 19. Trade Fair-Rhodesia. An international Trade Fair, staged annually about the beginning of May for ten days. Visitors are welcome to visit the grounds at any time during the year. Hillside Road. Bus No. 6a.
- 20. Public Library, Eighth Avenue, Fort Street. Reading and reference rooms are included, together with a reference collection of Rhodesiana, and a children's library.
- 21. National Free Library Service. The library, housed in modern buildings adjoining the Technical College, 12th Avenue, lends educational, scientific, technical and other books free of charge.

22. Historic Plaque-Railway Station. On the wall of the station building, near the entrance foyer on platform 1, is a plaque in porcelain describing the early historical events leading to the establishment of Bulawayo.

## INDERESTING SHORT TOURS

1. THE MATOPOS. This sea of granite hills, some the oldest rocks in the world, rises from the generally flat countryside surrounding Bulawayo and covers an area of about 1.250 square miles. It contains fantastic rock formations, a National Park, Bushman painted caves, picturesque dams, a well stocked Game Park and a comfortable Rest Camp. Bird life is prolific, and includes a large concentration of Black Eagles. Troops of baboons and vervet monkeys are common. A herd of sable antelope may be seen in the vicinity of the Circular Drive, On the hill Malindidzimu — the legendary place of benevolent spirits—is the tomb of Cecil John Rhodes, founder of Rhodesia. It was from this hill that Mr. Rhodes obtained what he called his "View of the World." Nearby are the tombs of Leander Starr Jameson, Rhodes' life-long friend and counsellor, and Sir Charles Coghlan, first Premier of Rhodesia, and also the Allan Wilson Memorial. The distance from Bulawayo to "View of the World" is 29 miles on a tarred road. Visitors should wear rubber-soled shoes, as the climb up the granite rock, although gradual, is slippery. The road passes the Matopos Dam, 16 miles from Bulawayo, with an hotel overlooking the dam.

Fishing; Picnicking; Camping; Caravaning. Picnic and camping sites abound in the Matopos. Most popular are those beside the picturesque dams, where good bass and bream fish-



ing can be had. Licences to fish can be obtained at nominal cost from certain sporting goods shops in Bulawayo, from the National Park Warden's office at Maleme Dam, and from Wardens at the various dams. Wood is provided at the main dams, and toilet facilities and piped water at some. Boating in the dams is limited to rowing or sailing craft except on Mtsheleli and Mpopoma dams, where outboard motors up to 7 h.p. are allowed. All boats must be registered with the Warden-in-

Charge.

Game Park. This 20,000 acre (8,000 ha) area surrounding Chintampa Dam has been fenced and a variety of animals can be seen in their natural surroundings from the roads in the Park. Visitors should stay on the roads and in their cars. Giraffe, eland, wildebeeste, sable, impala, kudu, buffalo, ostrich and white rhinoceros can be seen as well as many smaller species, and a variety of birds. The Park is 39 miles from



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Bulawayo on a fully tarred road, and it is open from half-anhour before sunrise to half-an-hour after sunset. An entrance fee of 50c per vehicle is charged. No dogs allowed.

Bushman Painted Caves. Four of these caves are of comparatively easy access. Some paintings are wonderfully preserved. At Pomongwe and Nswatugi Caves small museums have been established by the Historical Monuments Commission.

Accommodation—Rest Camps, For persons wishing to stay in the National Park, comfortable accommodation in attractive thatched rest huts is available at Maleme Dam, a beautiful 43-acre stretch of water cradled in a narrow valley between wooded hills. Food must be taken. A store approximately five miles away supplies some foodstuffs. No dogs allowed.

There is a privately run unlicensed guest house on the Antelope Road about seven miles from the Game Park.

Rest huts may be booked in advance through the Central Booking Office, P.O. Box 8151, Causeway, Salisbury or, for immediate bookings, through the Warden, Rhodes Matopos National Park, Private Bag 42K, Bulawayo. Telephone Matopos 0-1913.

There is much to see and do in the Matopos, and visits can be long or short, as time permits. Detailed brochures and maps are available from the Publicity Association.

2. CYRENE MISSION—20 miles. Cyrene is an African school belonging to the Anglican Church and is well known for the style of its art work. The Church is decorated with a fine series of murals and some richly carved furniture. Carvers and painters may be seen at work during the usual hours. As the staff of Cyrene are all teachers, visitors should telephone Matopos 0-0132 in advance.

Proceed along the Plumtree road through the light industrial sites for 18 miles, then turn left at signpost for the Mission, which is two miles further on.

Visitors can return to Bulawayo via the Matopos, a slightly longer journey (27 miles).

3. KHAMI RUINS. Situated 14 miles from the City on a fully tarred road in the midst of pleasant countryside, the ruins were discovered in 1897, and it is believed that the buildings date from the 17th century and that they were inhabited by the Rozwi people until about 1820. Part of the ruins overlooks the Khami Dam and Khami Gorge. They consist of a series of terraces supported by massive granite walls, some of which have a chequer pattern. A site museum, erected by the National Monuments Commission, displays relies found in the Khami Ruins and the adjacent area. Proceed west on Eleventh

Avenue on to the Khami road. No bus service. Guide books are available from booksellers, the National Museum, and from the site museum at Khami. (National Monument No. 6).

- 4. AFRICAN CRAFT VILLAGE. Situated on the Matopos road, 14 miles from the city, is the African Craft Village, Mtetwa's Kraal. Constructed on traditional lines, it depicts Ndebele rural life in depth, embracing even livestock and crops. Visitors can see the day-to-day life of the tribesmen, and have explained to them the intricacies of Ndebele customs. A feature of the village over the week-ends is the war dancing of this warrior tribe. There is a well stocked curio shop with a wide range of genuine African handcrafts. Entrance fee: 35 cents; children free.
- 5. HILLSIDE DAMS. Four miles from Bulawayo, and a very altractive picnic spot. In well wooded and attractive surroundings, the area it a nature reserve and is protected as a private game and bird sancutary. There is a variety of pleasant walks, and fishing is available. A representative collection of Southern African aloes has been established. A tea kiosk is open at week-ends. Band performances are frequently given. Proceed along the Hillside road for three miles then turn left. The route is well signposted. Bus No. 6a. (National Monument No. 43.)



- 6. SNAKE PARK. Six miles from the city at Woodville Park, this park contains a variety of snakes from many parts of the world. Teas and light refreshments are available. Open from 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily. Entrance fees: Adults 25 cents, children 10 cents.
- 7. CIRCULAR DRIVE VIA HOPE FOUNTAIN MISSION. This attractive drive of 21 miles covers the southern and eastern outskirts of the City, and passes Hope Fountain Mission, founded in 1870 by the London Missionary Society. It is the continuation of the Hillside road. No bus service (See next paragraph.)
- 8. OLD JESUIT MISSION. A pleasant short drive (12 miles) is to the site of this Mission (National Monument No. 47) at Old Bulawayo, where the remains of the oldest European-built dwelling in Bulawayo still stands. It was originally a trading store, but the buildings were bought by the Jesuit Fathers in November, 1879, after permission had been obtained from Lobengula to stay in Bulawayo and establish a mission. An "indaba" tree marked with a granite slab can be seen 350 yards along the road from the Mission on the return journey. It is on the right hand side. Almost opposite, on the other side of the road, is a track leading a short distance to the site of the first Bulawayo, before Lobengula transferred his kraal to the site of the present Government House in 1881. The remains of Lobengula's wagon shed and hut foundations can still be seen. Proceed along the Hillside road for 73 miles, turning right at the road marked Criterion Road: 41 miles along this road is a signpost showing the way to the Mission, about 400 yards walk.
- 9. MZILIKAZI MEMORIAL. Fourteen miles south of Bulawayo on the old Gwanda Road is the memorial to Mzilikazi, the founder and leader of the Matabele nation. Originally one of the fighting leaders and favourites of the Zulu tyrant Chaka, Mzilikazi was forced by Chaka out of Zululand and so, with his followers, he plundered and fought his way to what is now known as Matabeleland. The memorial was erected beneath an old Umugugutu tree with money raised by European subscriptions on the site of what was Mzilikazi's royal town of Mhlahlandlela. (National Monument No. 39.) Road partly tarred.
- NALETALE; DHLO-DHLO; REGINA. These ancient stone ruins are situated midway between Bulwayo and Gwelo and can be reached from the main road on good gravel roads.

Maps, brochures and guide books are available from the offices of the Publicity Association, which will be delighted to advise visitors on local tours to fit in with their available time.

#### ENTERTAINMENT

Entertainment facilities for visitors are excellent. There is a modern theatre where plays and musicals are frequently staged, and the two City Halls in the Civic Centre are also used by many overseas entertainers and groups which visit Bulawayo throughout the year. The city has its own Municipal Orchestra and symphony concerts are held regularly, at many of which international artistes give recitals. There are four cinemas and a Drive-In cinema 5 miles along the Johannesburg road. The programmes appear in the daily paper.

Horse racing takes place under the auspices of the Matabeleland Turf Club every second Sunday afternoon. The entrance to the racecourse is in Third Street extension, approximately 1½ miles from the city centre. Spectator facilities are very good, and track and viewing rings are turfed,

The city has its own Television and Broadcasting stations, and most hotels have lounges where television can be seen.

All sports are catered for and weekly fixtures are held on various grounds in the city. All Sports Clubs have social memberships.

For the younger set, two discotheques are available. There is a Rho-Putt miniature golf course open daily, including Sundays and Public Holidays, on the Hillside road, adjoining and in the grounds of Trade Fair-Rhodesia. The McDonald Club, a social and recreational club for single men and women and young married couples between the ages of 18 and 40, welcomes visitors on temporary membership. There are tennis courts, a swimming pool, billiard room and library. Frequent dances are held. The Club is in Seventh Street, Salisbury road.

Bulawayo has more than 130 different clubs, societies and associations to cater for every taste. Full particulars may be obtained from the Publicity Association.

#### Dining, Wining and Dancing

All licensed hotels cater for meals. Some also have grill-rooms and specialise in business and cold buffet luncheons. There are numerous restaurants which cater for every palate with a wide range of international dishes, and for the more casual occasions there are many pleasant tea-rooms and coffeebars. 



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#### HOUSING

Houses and flats to rent are in demand and somewhat difficult to obtain. Unfurnished bachelor flats are available from \$28 to \$32 per month; flats from \$36 to \$60; houses from \$50 to \$80 per month. There is a limited amount of furnished rooms and flats.

The average detached, three-bedroomed house would cost between \$9,000 and \$12,000 to build or buy, including ground. Cheaper housing is available.

#### EDUCATION

Over 50 schools cater for all phases of education. In addition to fee paying Government schools, several state-aided private schools are available. There is a Technical High School and also a Technical College, which has a Department of Commerce offering a full range of courses, some of which are at professional level. #### TOURIST ATTRACTIONS REACHED FROM BULAWAYO

VICTORIA FALLS (National Monument No. 1). The finest sight in Africa, and the world's mightiest curtain of falling water, the Victoria Falls is 274 miles north of Bulawayo on a national highway. Average driving time is 5½ to 6 hours. Two hotels are situated adjacent to the Falls. Comfortable and well equipped rest camps are established on the southern bank of the Zambesi river, close to and above the Falls. There is a restaurant and shops and a car hire service. Other attractions include a Game Park and launch trips upriver. A Casino is open nightly. The Victoria Falls is served by air, rail and road from Bulawayo.

WANKIE NATIONAL PARK (Main Camp) 174 miles on the Victoria Falls road. One of Africa's largest and most accessible game sanctuaries. More than 5,000 square miles in extent, the Park is noted for its wide variety of game and for its observation platforms overlooking waterholes, where visitors can sit and watch and photograph game.

Three comfortable rest camps are established in the Park, each with a restaurant and shop. Two of them are open all the year round. Early booking is essential.



LAKE KARIBA. Binga, at the western end of the lake, about 180 miles from the dam wall and 120 miles from Wankie National Park, provides good tiger fishing and has comfortable chalet accommodation. The gravel road to Binga passes through magnificent scenery after turning off from the main Bulawayo-Victoria Falls road at Dett crossroads, 175 miles from Bulawayo.

ZIMBABWE RUINS: (National Monument No. 2) LAKE KYLE AND GAME PARK. 200 miles east of Bulawayo and 17 miles south of Fort Victoria, the Zimbabwe Ruins are believed to be at least 1,000 years old. They contain between 80,000 and 100,000 tens of granite blocks, laid without mortar. Nearby is the beautiful Lake Kyle with its scenery reminiscent of the Scottish highlands, and boating and fishing. At Zimbabwe there are hotels and a National Park Rest Camp. Across the lake there is a Game Park, Rest Camp and motel.

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
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
